

# **Thaer Ahmad**

Thaer Ahmad, MD is a board certified emergency medicine physician working at Advocate Christ Medical Center in Chicago.

He currently serves as an attending physician at and is the Assistant Program Director for the Emergency Medicine

Residency Program and the Global Health Director for the Emergency Department at Advocate Christ. Dr. Ahmad is a board member of the Palestinian American Medical Association and a past board member of MedGlobal. Dr. Ahmad also works as an Assistant Clinical Professor at the University of Illinois. He has served in Gaza at Nasser and Al-Aqsa Hospital, as well as in Lebanon during the recent escalations. Dr. Ahmad has spent time in Syria, Jordan, Turkey, Kenya, and Greece working on local healthcare capacity building projects.

# Julie Kosowski

Julie Kosowski is a human rights activist and member of Jewish Voice for Peace. She is the daughter of a Holocaust survivor and lived in Israel during the first year of the 1987 Intifada. In November of 2023, she was one of more than 100 protesters arrested at a ceasefire demonstration at the Ogilvie Transportation Center in Chicago, Illinois.

# **Huwaida Arraf**

Huwaida Arraf is a Palestinian American attorney and human rights activist. She has been involved in a number of legal and grassroots initiatives for Palestinian rights. In 2001, she co-founded the International Solidarity Movement (ISM), a Palestinian-led non-violent resistance movement. which has twice been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. Huwaida is the former Chairperson of the Free Gaza Movement, and from August to December 2008, led 5 successful sea voyages to the Gaza Strip to challenge Israel's illegal blockade on the 2 million Palestinians living there. She was one of the organizers of the Gaza Freedom Flotilla and was traveling with it when it was lethally attacked by Israeli forces on 31 May 2010. In 2011, she was one of the six Palestinian Freedom Riders, who attempted to ride segregated Israeli settler public transport, for which they were harassed then violently arrested.

Deborah Buffton taught at the
University of Wisconsin-La Crosse for
33 years before retiring in 2020. Her
courses included World History, French
History, and Chinese History, as well as
Peace and War, and the History of
Nonviolent Resistance Movements. She has

served on the Executive Committee of the WIPCS since 1993 and twice was Executive Director. She is also a past president of the Peace History Society. She has published articles on war and peace in public spaces and is a co-editor of the Oxford Handbook of Peace History. She also organizes a weekly peace vigil in La Crosse, and generally tries to rabble-rouse for good causes.

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# **Dr. Jennifer Collins**Current WIPCS Executive Director, UW Stevens Point

Professor Jennifer Collins joined the Department of Political Science at UW-Stevens Point in 2007. She serves as the department chair. After graduating from college, she spent eight years working in Central and South America, first in Nicaragua with Witness for

Peace, and then in Ecuador with the Latin American Council of Churches (CLAI). She was the recipient of two Fulbright fellowships for field research in Ecuador and Bolivia and serves as a contributing editor to the Handbook of Latin American Studies.

Ax DeLessio, PhD is an educator, sociologist, and demographer who seeks to advance liberatory social change and instigate/interrogate intellectual engagement with democracy and government. She has given lectures in and outside the classroom, in geographies

from Argentina to Milwaukee, and taught at Willamette University,
Portland State, and Marylhurst University prior to its closure.
Previously she worked on projects financed by the National
Institutes of Health (NIH) and for The Center for Rural Pennsylvania
during her years earning her doctorate at Penn State. DeLessio has
published on veganism and its linkages with gender/masculinity,
and been interviewed about this work in English and Spanish on
radio, television, and for newspaper stories, across the political

in Milwaukee, and now orients herself towards political spaces while
also thoroughly enjoying teaching in the classroom. She deeply
